RI February House E&C Hearing



- Addressed residential recycling and plastics
 - Recycling has multiple sectors
 - Multiple "pressure points" in the residential systems
 - Markets are vital
 - Citizen education is key
 - Improved quality
 - Markets
 - Consistent supplies for manufacturing





RECYCLE Act (S.2941/H.R. 5906)

Authors:

- Senators Rob Portman, Debbie Stabenow (D-MI)
- Representatives Dean Phillips (D-MN) and Dave Joyce (R-OH)
- Key Components:
 - Provides \$75M to EPA for public education and awareness regarding residential recycling. (ISRI was instrumental in developing this bill)
- Bi-partisan with no opposition



RECOVER Act (H.R. 5115)

Authors

- Representatives Raul Cardenas (D-CA) and Larry Buschon (R-IN)
- Key Components:
 - \$500 Million for residential recycling collection & processing infrastructure
 - No market development for collected/processed materials
 - Little focus on public awareness and education to prevent contamination
 - Environmental and much of manufacturing community opposes
- Bi-partisan, no Senate companion



Break Free from Plastic Pollution Act (S.4510/H.R. 5845)

- Authors:
 - Senator Tom Udall (D-NM), Jeff Merkley (D-OR) and Alan Lowenthal (D-CA)
- Key Components:
 - Bans plastic bags, establishes deposit fees and extended producer responsibility
 - Contains unrealistic goals such as 100% recycled content (for plastic bags that would be banned) and mandatory 100% collection rates
- No Republican support in either Chamber





Save our Seas Act 2.0 (S.1982/H.R.3508)

- Authors:
 - Senators Dan Sullivan (R-AL), Sheldon Whitehouse (D-RI)
 S.1982 and Suzanne Bonamici and Don Young (R-AK)
- Key Components:
 - Global approach
 - Marine Foundation
 - Domestic infrastructure to prevent marine plastics
 - Reports to Congress
 - Bi-partisan with no opposition
 - Passed Senate and House: needs conference
